Department Overview

The Murray Police Department (MPD) serves as the primary law enforcement agency for the city of Murray, Kentucky. Located in the western part of the state, Murray is the county seat of Calloway County and is home to around 19,000 residents. The department is responsible for ensuring public safety, maintaining order, and enforcing laws within the city limits.

MPD provides a range of services, including patrol, criminal investigations, traffic enforcement, community policing, and emergency response. It operates with a commitment to public service, transparency, and community involvement. The department works closely with other local, state, and federal agencies to address crime and improve overall safety.

Murray is also home to Murray State University, which adds a unique dimension to the department's responsibilities, as they serve both the residential community and the student population.

MPD emphasizes community engagement, holding events and outreach programs to build trust and foster positive relationships between officers and residents. The department is staffed by 37 sworn officers, 7 emergency telecommunicators, and one records specialist.

Patrol Services Division

The Patrol Services Division of the Murray Police Department plays a crucial role in maintaining public safety and order throughout the community. This division is dedicated to providing proactive policing by responding to calls for service and actively engaging in crime prevention efforts. Officers in the Patrol Services Division are responsible for patrolling neighborhoods, ensuring a visible law enforcement presence, and deterring criminal activity before it occurs. They respond to a wide variety of emergency situations, from accidents and medical emergencies to domestic disturbances and violent crimes.

In addition to responding to emergencies, officers in this division focus on traffic enforcement to ensure road safety, reduce accidents, and deter impaired or reckless driving. They work to maintain order on the roads by enforcing laws related to speeding, seat belts, driving under the influence, and other violations that can endanger the community.

Patrol officers also conduct routine checks on businesses, schools, and public spaces to ensure these areas remain safe and secure. Support Services Division

The Support Services Division of the Murray Police Department plays an essential role in the overall functioning of the department by providing specialized support in key areas of law enforcement. This division is made up of two critical components: the Criminal Investigations Unit and the Telecommunications Unit. Each of these units is integral to ensuring that the department operates efficiently and effectively in tackling crime and maintaining public safety.

The **Criminal Investigations Unit** is responsible for handling more complex and in-depth investigations that go beyond initial police responses. Detectives in this unit specialize in investigating a variety of serious crimes, including theft, assault, fraud, homicide, and other major offenses. They work tirelessly to gather evidence, interview witnesses, analyze crime scenes, and follow up on leads to solve cases. Their work often requires collaboration with other law enforcement agencies, forensic experts, and legal professionals. By conducting thorough investigations and building strong cases, detectives in this unit help bring perpetrators to justice and provide closure to victims and their families.

The **Telecommunications Unit** plays a vital role in ensuring effective communication across all levels of the department. This unit is responsible for managing and operating the department's communication systems, including handling emergency 911 calls, dispatching officers to incidents, and coordinating the flow of information between the public and law enforcement. Telecommunications specialists ensure that officers receive critical information in real-time, enabling them to respond quickly and efficiently to emergencies. They also play a key role in maintaining communication within the department, ensuring that officers in the field are supported and have access to the resources and information they need to perform their duties safely and effectively.

Together, these units in the Support Services Division strengthen the overall capability of the Murray Police Department to respond to incidents, investigate criminal activity, and maintain a high level of public safety. By providing crucial support services, the division helps ensure that both routine and complex law enforcement operations are carried out smoothly, contributing to the overall effectiveness of the department in serving the community.

Community Services Division

The **Grant Management** team oversees securing and managing funding through grants, ensuring that the department has the necessary resources for specialized programs, equipment, and initiatives.

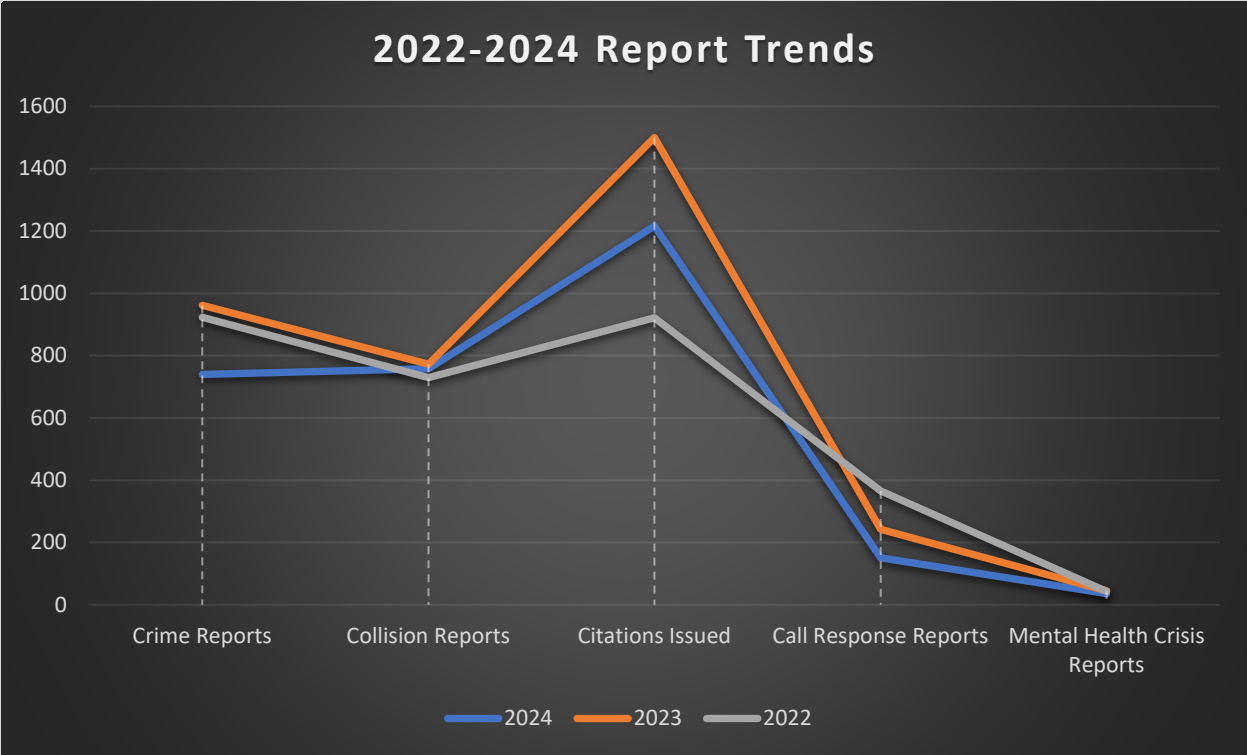

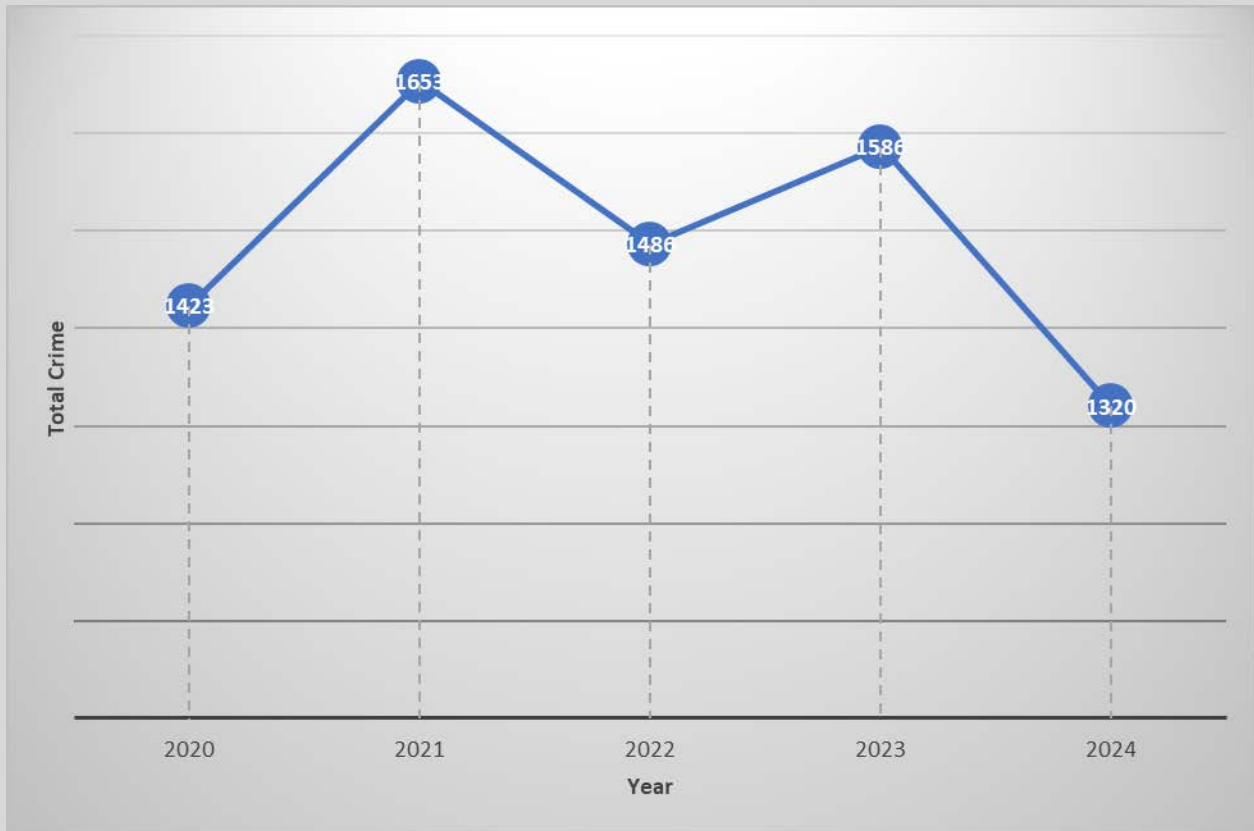

The FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is a nationwide effort that collects and compiles crime data from law enforcement agencies across the United States. Established in 1930, the UCR program aims to provide a reliable, consistent, and comprehensive set of crime statistics that can be used for research, policy-making, and public awareness. It collects data on various types of offenses, including violent crimes (such as murder, rape, and robbery) and property crimes (like burglary and larceny-theft), as well as arrests and law enforcement officer-related incidents.

NIBRS Stats

The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is a comprehensive crime reporting system used by law enforcement agencies to collect detailed data on criminal incidents. Unlike the traditional Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) summary system, NIBRS captures information about each specific offense within an incident, including details on victims, offenders, and arrestees, as well as the circumstances surrounding the crime. This enhanced data collection allows for more accurate analysis of crime patterns and trends, enabling law enforcement to better understand and address community safety concerns. NIBRS provides a more nuanced and detailed view of crime, supporting improved decision-making and resource allocation in law enforcement operations.

Response to Resistance

Response to resistance refers to the actions taken by law enforcement officers when an individual resists or attempts to avoid lawful authority or control during an encounter. It encompasses a range of responses, from verbal commands and de-escalation techniques to the use of physical force, including non-lethal and, in rare cases, lethal methods, depending on the circumstances and threat level faced by officers. The goal of a police officer's response to resistance is to protect themselves, the public, and the individual involved, while using the least amount of force necessary to safely resolve the situation. These incidents are closely monitored and reviewed to ensure that responses are appropriate, in compliance with department policies, and aligned with legal and ethical standards.

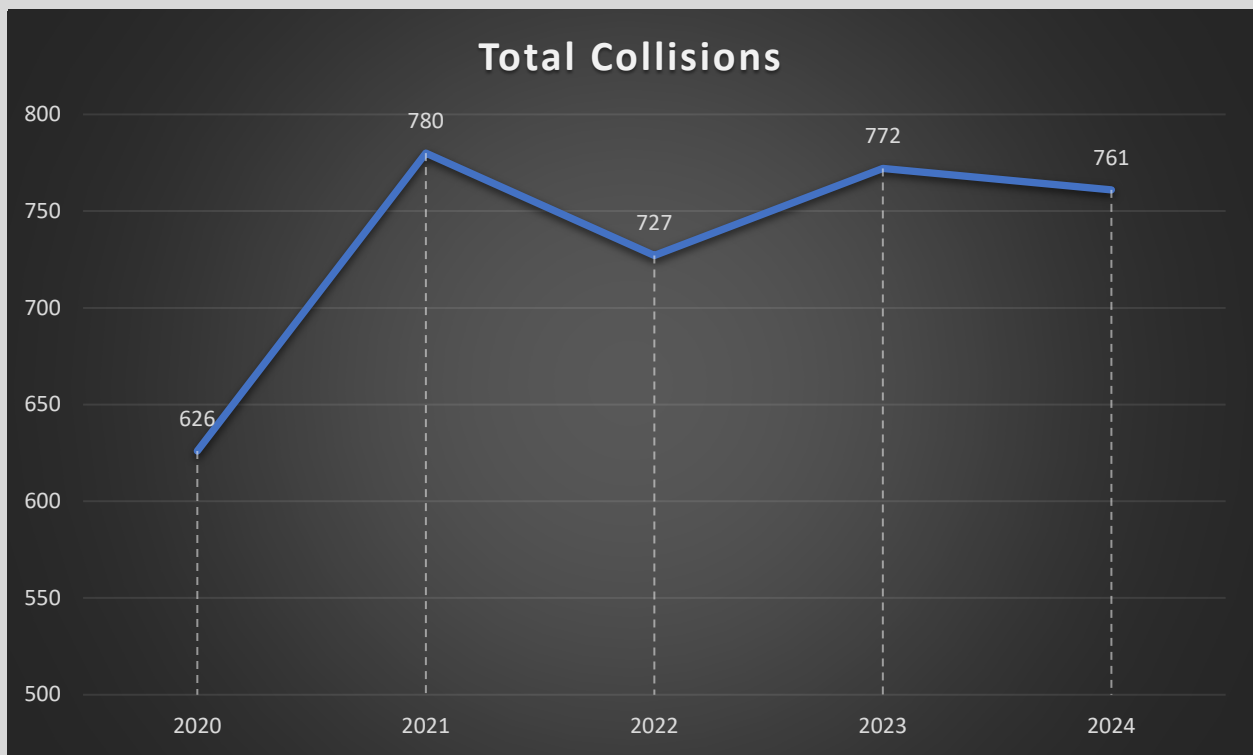
